





#### YE PILGRIM'S PROGRESSE

In the Fall and Winter of the year 1947 and on into the Spring of '48 a sturdy young band of pioneers under the leadership of Captain Richard Gunsell forged their way across a barren wilderness into a year filled with many new experiences. With the help of his aides Ardith Bidwell, Geraldine Shamee, Bob Lemon, and advisors, Mr. Menees and Mr. Helmer, ye olde classe of "51" managed happy times as well as hard work. We celebrated an unusually profitable hunting season by a good old-fashioned hoedown and prepared ourselves for the ordeal of our first "real"

The second year of our trials began one dreary September day in 1948 when, always on the move, we pulled up stakes and started out anew to break a trail into a vast new wilderness. Captain Tom Heslip, Denny Winkler, Alice Newton, and Gerry Shamee led us on under the guidance of Messrs. Jones and Ketterer. We glimpsed the horizon of our distant goal when through the purchase of class rings our band was united once more. Bob Kirkey, Jane Stroh, Tom Heslip, Alice Newton and Duane McDevitt were given sole authority on its design. We chose six of our most able members to replace any of the men of Boys' State who were unable to attend. We sponsored a dance at the Scout Hall for which each class member was given two tickets to sell. The party was a huge success and the proceeds furthered our little nest egg, as yet microscopic.

In the Fall of the year of our Lord 1949 we began our most exciting adventures. The way became a little clearer now and our store of knowledge and experience was growing rapidly. We fought for greater freedom and were strengthened by new arrivals from the nearby towns of Novi and Salem. Captain Bill Green and aides Dick Gunsell, Tom Heslip, and Bonnie Hannah led us ever onward while Mrs. Smith and Miss Giltner sought to lead us in the right direction. The women of our band showed off their culinary arts in numerous bake sales this year. Gail Bemish walked away with honors in the V.F.W. Essay contest and won the village award, also attaining the distinction of appointment to Girls' State. Mary Ann Karschnick was the top salesman in our magazine sales contest and won a beautiful wristwatch. Our treasury was boosted by this acquisition to the grand amount of \$1261. Johnny Rackov, Bob Kirkey, Bob Cole, Bob Prom, and Dick Gunsell, sponsored by various clubs around the village, went to Boys' State. We were all given Kuder preference tests early in the year to determine our abilities and some of us in Mr. Zwinck's classes took a series of aptitude tests. In December, under the able direction of Miss Panattoni we presented the Junior Play, "Life of the Party," which netted us over \$200. In the Spring, once again we were ready for new tasks and undertook the sponsorship of the annual J-Hop.

Under multicolored lights the setting of a tropical island with palm trees, twinkling stars and a sparkling pool illustrated our theme, "Paradise Isle."

After electing Johnny Rackov to the position of Mayor the following term we ended our third year by decorating for the Baccalaureate and Commencement exercises and wishing the departing oldsters a fond farewell.

Early in our final year of roving our last leaders took their places to guide us toward our final goal. With counselors like Mrs. Smith and Mr. Yahne to aid our captain Richard Gray, and his associates Bob Cole, Gail Bemish, and Bob Prom, the vast wilderness began to seem less dense. In the late Fall we presented our rollicking Senior Play "Brother Goose," once again under Miss Panattoni's leadership. The sale of Christmas cards proved an asset to our treasury as did several bake sales. In October another glimpse of the horizon appeared as our Senior pictures were taken. Promptly collections cropped up and soon exchange pictures had disappeared. Mimi Harrison was chosen by the class and teachers to receive the D.A.R. Award and we began planning a trip to Washington. Our trip committee turned into a money-making one and right away began encouraging townspeople to give suggestions for providing funds so every one in the class might go on the trip. We chose caps and gowns of light grey with orange and black tassels and started work on the Palladium while watching the numerals on our class rings coincide with those of the year.

Our biggest and last formal dance occurred in the Spring. It was our Senior Prom, which had as its theme "April in Paris."

Six days of an exciting trip to Washington gave us a much needed rest to prepare us for our final exams, which cropped up sooner than expected. Time began passing swiftly and before we knew it Class Night and Baccalaureate were upon us. Finally our goal had been reached and Commencement exercises put an end to our long pilgrimage.

We now have but to say a fond farewell to our alma mater and wish the incoming seniors all luck and guidance. In departing we wish also to thank the faculty and our parents for their warm understanding, tolerance, and co-operation during the past years and assure them that the help they have given freely will always encourage the same qualities in us.






### Library Club







The schedule included Holly, Milford, Romulus, Farmington, Clarkston, and Walled Lake.






