Revised Curriculum Adds Depth to Language Arts Dept.

A revised and expanded curriculum was the most noteworthy achievement of the English Department for this year. As eleventh-grade English teacher, Mr. Riddell commented, "The department has attempted to provide a program where each student can experience greater success than before. Each grade is divided into three levels: Basic, Regular, and Honors. This allows the student to work more at his own speed."

This program has been a success not only in the eyes of the teachers but also has been popular among the students, particularly Basic English. This section, under the direction of Mr. Hudson, caters to the student with reading difficulty and related English problems.

Another major change was of benefit to the seniors. It involved shifting English Liteerature back to the eleventh grade and American Literature to the tenth grade. Thus stimulating new interest among the seniors and underclassmen as well.

Our Foreign Language Department has also been on the move. Moving, that is, into their new language lab recently installed in D-50. The department has also expanded to include German I and French III, along with already offered Spanish I, II and III and French I and II.

"The Math Department feels that the new curriculum is quite a success as they are doing more for all students." This comment by Miss Lance, Department head sums up the feelings concerning our revised Mathematics Department.

This department is organized so students can choose courses which best fit their ability. For instance, in the ninth grade, each student chooses from four courses: basic mathematics, algebra-math (a two-year course for the student who cannot complete algebra I in one year), algebra I, and geometry for accelerated students.

This program continues throughout the next three years offering such courses as algebra I, geometry, algebra II, advanced math I and advanced math II.

The entire program is designed to stimulate interest in mathematics and to give the student the best possible working knowledge of the subject.

Greater Variety of Courses In Social Studie

Variety and flexibility mark this year's Social Studies Department. As in other departments, the social studies program has been revamped to better meet the needs of individual students. Students under this choose from three levels of study: Basic, Regular or Accelerated.

The department also has many long-range goals. Among them is the plan to eventually arrive at a curriculum which will allow all required social studies courses to be completed before the senior year. This affords seniors with a greater freedom of choice in their senior year.

Under the present program, courses such as geography, world history, U.S. history, American government, economics, sociology and world problems, are offered.


The addition of retailing allowed N.H.S. to revive its co-operative program. A vocational-educational course, the co-op enables students to spend half their day in school, and the other half getting valuable on-the-job-experience.

The Business Department hopes to expand further as soon as room permits. It plans to offer such things as an office practice class, a business law class, shorthand II and more typing classes.

The Home Economics Department offers a full four years of home economics plus a semester of home and family living. Several areas are studied such as foods and nutrition, textiles and clothing, child growth and development, health and safety, and household equipment.

The girls in home ec. particularly enjoy the practical application of theories and techniques.

Practical Arts

Industrial Arts covers several areas. There are three machine metals courses, which begin by furnishing elementary information in metal work and advance to work in automotive welding. In automotive mechanics students work on chassis and engines and learn the fundamentals of electricity in the automobile. A garage service analysis is taken to check maintenance skills on automobiles.

Electricity and electronics courses are also offered in which students do experimental work and advanced problems.

Four years of drafting and mechanical drawing are offered and they are taught by Mr. Anderson. Revolution problems, drawing machine parts, building model homes and die design problems are examples of this extensive program.








