In The News Were . . .

An assassination and two assassination attempts filled this year's news. After a few months in office, an attempt was made on President Ronald Reagan's life. John Warnock Hinckley Jr. opened fire on Reagan and his party and wounded Reagan, Press Secretary James Brady, a security agent and a police officer.

One of the most active Popes ever, John Paul II, spent 1981 travelling the world, against the advice and fears of many. Unfortunately, his problem developed at home in Rome. While travelling in a procession through St. Peter's Square, a Turkish terrorist shot and wounded the Pope and two American women. The Pope recovered and continued to be active around the world.

The most serious of these acts of terrorism was the fatal shooting of Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. During a military parade celebrating the end of the Israeli-Egyptian war of 1973 a group of fanatical Muslims, belonging to the army, opened fire on the reviewing stand killing Sadat, five top military officials and injuring one American. President Sadat was a promoter of peace in the Arab world and created much controversy when he signed a peace treaty with Israel in 1977.

Nineteen eighty one was also a year of strikes. The first strike in the history of baseball disrupted the 1981 season. The players protested the free agent system, and the fans protested the strike even though most sympathized with the plight of the players. The fans enthusiasm picked up immediately at the end of the strike and continued up to the World Series where the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the New York Yankees. The air traffic controllers also went on strike in August, asking for a higher salary, but they lost their jobs as a result of violating a federal law, which prohibits federally employed workers from striking. This union, PATCO, was dissolved legally but continued to operate despite both President Reagan's ruling and the resignation of the PATCO union leader.

Achievements in flight began this year with the second launching of the space shuttle. The space shuttle was designed to carry men and equipment into space and return back to earth to be re-used. Already two more space shuttles are being built and the world's first military spaceport is now under construction in California.

In the field of ballooning, the Double Eagle's successful three day flight across the Pacific created another first. Captain Ben Abruzzo and his crew completed this mission only one year after making history with the first successful crossing of the Atlantic.





In the wedding of the year, Prince Charles of Wales married Lady Diana Spencer on July 29, 1981 at St. Paul's Cathedral in London. The spectacular event was televised world-wide and proved that the power of the British monarchy is as strong as ever. Prince Charles is next in succession for the British throne.

In the fight of the year, Sugar Ray Leonard defeated Thomas Hearns for the undisputed World Welterweight Championship. It was a long and close fight but ended when the referee declared a T.K.O. in the fourteenth round. A rematch is inevitable.

Faulty design led to disaster in Kansas City, Missouri when a walkway collapsed in the lobby of the Hyatt Regency Hotel. One hundred thirteen people died in the first accident of this kind. The uppermost walkway was not strong enough to hold the weight of the people and collapsed onto another walkway directly beneath it. Both walkways landed onto the lobby, where a dance contest was being held.

Mother Nature revealed her beauty with the eclipse of the moon. The eclipse reached approximately fifty five percent and provided a spectacle for all who watched.

A giant step in the advancement of women came this year when Sandra Day O'Connor became the first female to serve on the Supreme Court. Justice O'Connor

previously served on the Arizona District Federal Court.

In the constant battle of espionage, a Soviet Submarine ran around near the high security Karlskrona Swedish naval base. The Swedes held the sub for several days, waiting for an explanation from the Soviets, but they blamed the mishap on faulty navigational equipment even though the navigation of the bay required the use of advanced navigational equipment and would have foundered far before approaching the base. The sub was finally released, but with much controversy because it was suspected that the submarine contained nuclear weapons after abnormally high levels of radiation were detected on the outside of the submarine.







Also in the News . . .

Internationally, one of the gravest situations occurred when martial law was declared in Poland on December 13, 1981. On that day, Solidarity was banned, and most of its top leaders including Lech Walesa, were arrested. The Poles retaliated by staging hundreds of strikes, sit-ins and marches. There were several clashes between civilians and the military and unconfirmed reports placed total deaths over 700 and arrests of over 2000 dissidents.

The following month brought disaster in Washington D.C. No longer had the F.A.A. finished celebrating the longest fatality-free season when a Florida bound jet hit the 14th Street Bridge, killing six motorists and all but five people aboard the plane.

Locally, Michigan experienced the thrill of having Superbowl Sixteen at the Pontiac Silverdome that was nicknamed "Sweet Sixteen". Financially, the Superbowl was a success for most Detroit-area businesses. This was also the first Superbowl held in a northern city. Despite a cold front and snow, both fans and Michiganians enjoyed themselves.
