

Time to construct: One year **Work force**: Sometimes up to 100 workers per day


Keeping order in the school are three administrators, 114 teachers, police, athletic directors, secretaries, and support staff.







The dancers started at home preparing for the big night ahead of them, dressing up in their dance attire and waiting for their dates and groups of friends to be ready too.






Nightmare's over

Junior Megan Dielenhein said, "We listen to music backstage to get pumped up before a performance."


Off stage, the cast members shared a close bond.



She said, "I like to have my friends on the walls so I can remember all the good times."



Despite different sounds, each band has the same goal: to bring the rock.









Of the five days students could show their spirit, pajama day and Orange and Black day were the favored theme days.


Mr. Bowen had a fairly unique view when asked which day was his favorite: "I like Saturday the best because it's all over!"








Watts said, "We make sure the girls are in line and tell them to bring it all to the court because if you leave anything out, you'll regret it at the end of the game no matter if we win or lose."


With hard work and perseverance, the girls practiced daily and had an occasional team

With this confidence in their playing, the girls maintained a positive attitude not only in their games, but also at practices as they finished with a wellrounded season and a happy ending.







Hunt, Greg Jones, and Jim Gates cleaned up with All-Division medals.




The doubles teams of Amanda Darish and Jen

Taylor Payne disagrees, however. She said, "The best part of the season was Sindu Ravipati constantly hitting Ronak Vashi with the ball."





with a time of 15:39, tying the best all-time cross country record for Northville, set by Clark Couyoumjian in 1980.


Additionally, four freshmen qualified for the USATF meet. Even though the race is only 4K instead of the usual 5K, they placed well.



Bennetts said, "We may have a small team, but the guys we have are the most dedicated; it shows in their performance."







Between helping each other up off the ice and chasing each other around the locker rooms after practice, this team certainly made time to have a winning season.




Unlike years past, the team included freshmen through seniors, as well as a new coaching staff.





"Starting off two and zero really helps, too," said Sorensen.






"This is my fourth year on the team and it is definitely the best!" said senior captian Steve Minier.

Although the school wrestling season only lasts a few short months, these dedicated athletes prepare and condition all year round.





For the first time, the


team's roster is almost half and half — with 11 Novi girls and 13 Mustangs.

It would seem the odds were stacked against the team with the usual roaring rivalry between the schools, but the Wildstangs have managed to rise above it again and go for the gold.






Kelly Wasalaski added, "We've done better this year than the two years before. Our record has improved so much!" The four seniors were glad to end their high school volleyball career with a great season.


The juniors appreciated the record as well, but the difference for them this year was the jump from JV to

Next year, the remaining players hope to enjoy the season as much as they did this year and would be glad to even see as many wins on the record.








Both teams worked hard this year perfecting their form and improving their averages.












The idea of bringing coed cheer back came from Coach Melanie Obrigkeit, who herself cheered in high school on a co-ed team and enjoyed the experience.


A varsity cheerleader of three years, junior Katie Scott said, "It's fun and it's different with guys on the team. They help with things we couldn't achieve with just girls."






The varsity team had three statewide competitions against the top teams in the state, so they practiced two hours every day, ten months out of the year.





Despite the credit union's association with a professional bank, it is students
























With energetic and demanding kids constantly around them, it's no wonder the staff members stay on their toes and are always ready for whatever obstacles come their way.





Cronin races because he loves the challenge, and for the joy of his parents witnessing the entire experience. He has been running races for 20 years.


Cronin ran in college; he went to Loras College in Iowa. He had the support and love of his family ever since he started doing something he loves: running.






secretary Marie Greenman.







With three years down, and one more to go, the junior class awaits their final year in high school.



Overall, junior year has been a successful year and a stepping-stone toward a successful senior year.








The design of the divider pages was inspired by a layout in the September 2003 issue of *Entertainment Weekly* and was adapted to fit the different sections.

Design of the pages was achieved using Adobe PageMaker 7.0 with help from Herff-Jones' PageMaster 8.
Additional effects and photo retouching were created in Adobe Photoshop 7.0.
These technical feats were accomplished using six IBM PCs and five slightly newer, slightly slicker Compags.

Headlines were set in Franklin Gothic Heavy and Demi. Body copy was set in 9.5-point Century Schoolbook with 12-point leading. Captions were set in 8-point Franklin Gothic Demi. Additional coverage was set in Franklin Gothic Book.

Most photographs were taken using two Sony Mavica CD500 mini-disc digital cameras — when the discs were working. Additional photos were taken by Prestige and by staffers using various point-and-shoot cameras.

Publication of the book is made possible through the sale of advertising and parent pride messages. The cost to purchase a 2004 Palladium is \$50.

All 1,550 copies of this $8-\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" format, 288-page, all-color book were printed on 100# Bordeaux with non-printed CCN-4 Gray endsheets. (The students said they wanted to sign their names there.)

The four-color, litho cover was designed using Photoshop and PageMaker. The title and date were custom embossed on a Permocote 120-point weight cover board with UV and stay flat matte lamination.

The whole affair was stitched together using Smyth Sewn binding and printed by Herff-Jones' Mission, Kansas plant.
